5 That morning I had one of the light Post Office vans, and I thought I would have an easy day. I was working in the SW15 area of London, across the river. Nice quiet streets with flowering trees. It was like a trip to the country. I was enjoying myself. After forty years with the Post Office, I still hadn't learned that trouble comes when you don't expect it.

10 I drove to the third box. There was a girl standing near it. I thought she was waiting for someone.

She was.

15 I got out of the van and went to the box with my keys and my letter-bag. I saw that she was watching me. I could feel her eyes on the back of my neck. I opened the box, and there were the letters. Not many - about twenty. I was putting them in the bag when the girl moved towards me.

I wondered whether she was going to attack me. But she was alone. Quite a pretty girl: well-dressed, educated. She looked very unhappy. She was worried about something. I wasn't interested. I hadn't time. In my job, you must work fast before nine o'clock.

20 I turned and went to the van. But she was speaking to me. I couldn't quite hear what she was saying. "Is anything wrong, Miss?" I said. I opened the van door. I didn't want to stop and talk.

"Yes," she said. "There is. But you could help me, if you were very kind."

25 I didn't like the sound of that. I told myself I would give her just one minute. She was in trouble, and I have daughters myself. So I said, "What can I do for you? I can only give you sixty seconds. In my job, you must get most of the work done before-"

She interrupted. "You can help me," she said. "You can easily do it. I've posted a letter. I want to get it back. If I can't, something terrible will happen. You *will* give it to me, won't you? Please?"

30 As I said, I've worked for the Post Office for forty years. When I first began, I used to wonder, "Will anybody ever ask me if they can get a letter back?" And now, at last, it had happened. Of course I couldn't do it. "Sorry," I said, shaking my head. "It's a rule, a very firm one. When you've put a letter in the box, the Post Office must take care of it until it reaches the right address."
