Mariel realised she sounded too sure of herself.

Ursule Kroll stood, hand on hip, staring through her.

'I - I might just be like the others, though.'

'You might be, yes. In that case, you will have proved I was correct.'

Mariel felt confused, overcome by the experiences of the past ten days she'd spent travelling and settling in. Even living away from home in Boston hadn't prepared her for this.

'I have heard you.'

'Heard me? How?'

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'They sent me cassettes. Did you think I would accept you if I didn't know how you sing?'

True. Mariel hadn't thought of that.

'That is why you are here. To learn from me.'

'Because I wasn't very good?'

'Because you sing very—.' Kroll stopped herself. 'You are not the same as the Americans that people here tell me about. Too big for their shoes.'

Mariel let go of the chair, and pulled herself taller.

'I think, the two of us, we have much to do together.' Kroll didn't smile. Singing was a serious business. But she did permit herself a couple of nods. It was approval of a sort.

'And I think, young lady, we can achieve good results.'

Mariel could only hope and pray.

Kroll's appearance complemented her manner. Cultivated, suave, decorous, restrained. Mariel could imagine her in a high wig and crinoline gown – of the finest silk, of course – watching the antics of her fellow humans from behind a spread fan. 'Yes', Mariel said. 'I see.'
